The children have had a very busy first term! They have learnt lots of new skills and have made plenty of new friends. Year 2

Year 2 have been learning how to write instructions this week. First, we made a crown fit for royalty, then we wrote instructions for how we had made them and finally, we wore our crowns like king and queens. In maths, we have been practising our number bonds to ten then using these facts to work out related number bonds to 100. In topic, we helped Mrs Hannon tidy up her very messy drawer by sorting all of the objects into different materials with different properties. If you have any drawers at home that need sorting, please ask us! Year 2 have worked so hard this term and Mrs Hannon is extremely proud of us all. Year 3

We have been continuing with Read Write Inc as per usual whilst the other reading group have been looking at non-fiction texts and finding information to answer questions. In English we have completed a unit of work on non-chronological texts, writing reports about dragons. In Maths, we have been adding multiples of 10 to three-digit numbers. Whilst in our topic work about Predators, we have been looking at fossilisation and how it occurs over thousands and even millions of years.

Year4

This week in Year 4 we have been busy writing our own non-chronological reports about dragons! We spent the beginning of the week planning and creating skeleton maps, then wrote, edited, and published in the latter half of the week! Ask me all about my dragon!

In maths, we have been counting in 25s. Although this was easy at first as we could spot a pattern, it became trickier when the start number wasn't ending in 00, 25, 50 or 75.

We have had so much fun in science this week! We each were given a biscuit, a zip-lock bag and some water. First, we crushed the biscuits in the bag, then added water. After this, we mixed the ingredients together which created a pulp. Our next step was to pour this into tights and squeeze out the liquid. We were then left with the end product... biscuit poo!! This experiment was to aid us with our digestive system learning. Ask me about the different body parts and their functions! Why not re-create this experiment at home, too? It's great fun!



Year 5

Class 5 have been having lots of fun this week. In English we became journalists and published our own articles on the death of Tutankhamun. We enjoyed a fun morning of learning lots of interesting Egyption facts with our visitor, Clive Pig, including the mummification process! In maths we have been sharpening out skills on drawing and interpreting graphs. Well done Year 5, have a lovely half term!

Year 6

This week, Year 6 have tackled the complexity of multiplication. The children have persevered to develop their understanding of the written method for multiplication, and we have been impressed with their learning. We started our new unit of writing focusing on Autobiographies and, throughout the week, have developed our understanding of the features of autobiographical writing. The children have written about their own lives, and it was wonderful getting to know them through their writing.

In Science, the children have also engaged in the 'nature vs nurture' debate when thinking about a variety of factors such as our appearance and our likes and dislikes. The children have also discussed family resemblance and considered how they are similar or different to their own family members.

Well done year 6 for your hard work this term. I believe you are ready for a well-deserved break.

Oracy Challenge


Here is a simple discussion activity that you can do together as a family. The aim is to get children sharing ideas with their families and developing their vocabulary and imagination.
