Dear parents/carers,

I was very proud to see how well the children took part in the minute's silence yesterday demonstrating respect and thankfulness for men and women who serve in our military forces, both past and present. Photos showing this are in this week's newsletter as well on our social media platforms.

Last week, I mentioned the curriculum projects currently being taught in our year groups. This week, I would like to draw your attention to our marking and feedback policy. We use a simple traffic lighting system for the children to self-assess and self-reflect on their learning after each lesson. This helps them to become reflective learners and encourages them to take ownership of how they learn. The marking made by teachers uses two colours, yellow to highlight any spelling or punctuation corrections, number or letter reversal or incorrect maths calculations. The children from Years 2 to 6 use a 'purple polishing pen' to make these corrections. Year 1 make corrections using pencil. Pink is used to highlight evidence in learning where the child is achieving the learning objective of that lesson. This makes it clear to both pupil and teacher exactly how they are meeting the learning set out and helps to reinforce this visually. Below is a snapshot taken from our marking policy to help clarify this. Please go to our new look website where you can read how we mark your child's learning in full detail.

After each piece of work, the children will be given the opportunity to self-assess their learning by placing a 'traffic light' next to their learning objective. This will be based upon how well they think they have achieved their objective.

-  **Yellow:** Indicates that they have not understood their objective or have made little progress towards it.
-  **Green:** Indicates that they have started to demonstrate that they understand the objective but haven't fully achieved it.
-  **Pink:** Indicates that they have achieved the objective.

	Use a pink highlighter where children are showing good evidence of learning within year group expectations.
	Use a yellow highlighter to show misconceptions in which the children need to respond to. e.g. If a child has failed to use an apostrophe on three separate occasions, this suggests an underlying misconception which will need to be addressed.
	Use an orange highlighter in YEAR 6 only to indicate writing target and when that target has been successfully applied independently.

The response marking key is followed clearly in Years 1-6, whilst it is introduced progressively in EYFS.

Next week is Anti-Bullying Week when all classes will be participating in activities and discussions, and I will be delivering a whole school assembly on this very important topic too.

Friday, 19th November, is Children In Need, a very special charity that will be marked with 'spotty' mufti and a free Pudsey biscuit courtesy of the kitchen with a pound's donation.



Messages from Teachers

Reception

The children are learning so much! They are really enjoying our Number Time sessions where we have been learning how to 'subitise' (instantly recognising how many there is in a set without counting). The children have continued to enjoy our theme of The Gingerbread Man and are beginning to act out the story in their play with confidence. We have been sharing lots of books together - ask your child about our Favourite Five! Don't forget, we change books on Tuesdays and Fridays. Have a lovely weekend 😊

Year 1

This week we have begun to work on subtraction within maths. We did this in a variety of ways - counting backwards, using resources such as cubes and developing our 'fact families'. We have also continued to see how far we can count as a class, but this time we added a silly word instead of saying multiples of 10! Amazing stuff!

We have continued to work on our topic, Where the Wild Things Are, in English and this week have drawn pictures to match words, developed our understanding of the red words in our story, ordered words to create sentences and begun to think about how we can change the story for our 'big write'. Finally, we explored dinosaurs. What were they? What different types? How long ago did they live? We also looked at fossils and tried to match the correct fossil to the correct dinosaur. Another amazing week for everyone in year 1. WELL DONE!!!!

Year 2

This week, we have been practising our story 'Katie in London' using actions, expression and characters voices. We are now innovating our own version about 'Ben in Plymouth' who goes on an adventure riding on the back of a T-Rex! In maths we have using our number bond skills to add 1-digit numbers to 2-digit numbers. In Topic, we learned all about different monarchies and the different power British kings and queens have had through history. We also studied some portraits of famous kings and queens who all held an object in their hand which told the viewer something important about them. Next week, please bring in an object that best represents you or your interests.

Year 4

In English this week, year 4 have created a class adventure story based on 'The Firework-Maker's Daughter'. We decided that Stitch (our main character) had to battle through a tornado in order to be

hailed Queen! We also looked at how we can up-level our vocabulary using thesauruses and using fronted adverbials to make our sentences more interesting.

In maths, we have studied column addition with exchanging. Again, any work you could do on this at home would be appreciated. 😊 In our topic work, we have delved into the science topic 'sound'. We watched how a drum can make rice 'dance' and learnt how sound can travel. We have also spoken about Remembrance Day, what it means, and how we show respect. Why not have a go at making your own poppy to wear on Sunday?

Year 5

As usual, we have had a busy week in Year 5. All the children have been working incredibly hard. We have started to write our own Science Fiction stories based on The Jamie Drake Equation. The children have used brilliant writing skills and techniques, coupled with their knowledge and understanding of space. In maths, we are continuing to investigate and explore multiplication. We have been using new terminology and applying our knowledge to real-life scenarios. After our amazing Explorer Dome experience last week, we are particularly enjoying learning more about planets and our Solar System. Ask us questions, we can tell you some incredible facts!


Year 6

Stuart Road Primary Academy Safer School Streets day

We're working together with Plymouth City Council's Road Safety team, Plymotion teams and Sustrans to hold a **one-day trial** of a **Safer School Streets scheme** on **Monday, 22nd November 2021**.

A Safer School Street is where a road outside a school temporarily closes to **school-run and through motor traffic** during drop off and pick up times. This opens the street up to families travelling actively, making it safer to walk, cycle or scoot to school by tackling the main road safety concern that parents raise with us – the amount of traffic on the road during drop off and pick up times

The Safer School Streets day will be held on **Monday, 22nd November** where **Palmerston Street** will be closed to motorised traffic between **8.15am – 9.00am drop off times** and **2.00pm and 3.30pm pick up times**.

Please support the school with this initiative and chose to walk, cycle or scoot from home, or if this is not possible, to park a short distance away and walk, cycle or scoot the remaining distance. During the closure times motorised vehicles will be prevented from entering the road closure. We will be able to offer exemptions, if approved by the school in advance, for a valid reason such as mobility considerations and for residents living within the closure.

The Safer School Streets initiative is a trial and we would be grateful for feedback from pupils, families, local residents and staff in order to inform future decisions.

School Streets is an initiative which is being adopted by a growing number of schools across the nation. Not only will it improve road safety, but will also help to address traffic and parking concerns outside schools and encourage more people to think differently about how they travel to school. It will create a healthier, more liveable street environment around the school and local community, encouraging a reduction of car use and making the vicinity of the school community safer and cleaner, improving the quality of life for everyone.

Safer School Streets is also part of Plymouth City Council's Climate Emergency Action Plan and is supported by Councillor Jonathan Drear, Cabinet Member for Transport and is being delivered in partnership with Sustrans, the charity making it easier for people to walk and cycle.
