Messages from Teachers

Foundation

The children have been busy with writing a description of the giant from the Jack and the Beanstalk story and come up with their own words with describing how huge and scary he is! They have also enjoyed looking at different pop-up stories including 'Where's Spot?'- we have had a go at making our own pop-up cards and pictures. We have also had great fun in the garden looking for mini beasts- we have found plenty of worms and wood lice and handled them carefully. We have started looking at Numbots and started to hand out certificates to children who have completed different levels. You should all have log in details- it is suggested that your child engages with this 'little and often'. It is great fun and a great way of developing handling of numbers. We hope you all have a great half term break and look forward to seeing you all on your return.

Year 1

This week year 1 have been researching different mini beats with the view of writing about them. We have found out lots of fascinating facts about worms, spiders, and caterpillars. We then used this information to create our very own information posters for our chosen mini beats.

During maths we have continued to develop our understanding around numbers up to 50, tens and ones, as well as one more/less.

In topic the children have worked extremely hard creating different pieces of artwork around the life cycle of a caterpillar. We have used cutting and sticking for the egg, shading for the caterpillar, paint for the cocoon and pastels for the butterfly. We can't wait to show you our finished work.

Year 2

This week the children have written non-chronological reports about their chosen minibeast. In Science we have looked at the metamorphoses of a butterfly and have written about their life cycle. Children have perfected their sketching skills by drawing a minibeast. They had to look at pictures of a minibeast taking notice of small details and then use pencils to sketch.

In maths we have continued with practising the multiplication facts for the 2, 5- and 10-times table and this is an area where children would benefit from practising at home as well. I am so proud of the children in year 2 because they are showing ownership of their learning when they are practising their fluency skills via Numbots. Keep going year 2!


This week we are celebrating the children's successes in sketching and colouring and writing poems about minibeasts. Enjoy the photos bellow.

Have a restful half term Year 2! You really deserve it!














Year 3

What to do if your child develops symptoms of COVID 19

If your child develops symptoms of COVID-19, **you should inform the school and organise for your child to be tested** via the <u>NHS online portal</u> or by calling 119. Your household should isolate until you receive the test results giving the all clear.

Symptoms of COVID 19

The most common symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are a recent onset of:

- New continuous cough/and/or
- High temperature and/or
- A loss of, or change in, normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)

For most people, coronavirus (COVID-19) will be a mild illness.

How to stop COVID-19 spreading

There are things you can do to help reduce the risk of you and anyone you live with getting ill with COVID-19. Do:

- wash your hands with soap and water often do this for at least 20 seconds
- use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available
- wash your hands as soon as you get home

• cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze put used tissues in the bin immediately and wash your hands afterwards
