# **Messages from Teachers**

#### Foundation

Foundation Class have continued with part 3 of the Three Billy Goats Gruff story. The children are continuing to work really hard on holding sentences in their heads and then writing them. They are continuing to improve with this and proud of their efforts- well done Foundation Class! We have been looking at odd and even numbers following on from sharing groups of objects fairly.

#### Year 1

This week year 1 have begun exploring poetry. We began by finding out what a poem and poetry actually was before performing one ourselves in small groups. We then also developed our own Rainbow Colours poem, improved it, edited, and then 'published' it.

During maths we have recapped length and height, doing so in various ways. Finally, we have continued to develop our reading skills in RWI. Our current focus is to improve the fluency of our reading and are doing this by learning new words and practicing the speed of our read.

# Year 2

The children worked hard to finish writing persuasive letters based on the book `The Day the Crayons Quit`. They have chosen another classroom object that is unhappy about their role and wrote persuasive letters to convince the audience that they are overworked, tired and really need a break. They have designed the front cover of their own books and , as promised, we are eager to share them with you.

We have also continued our unit work entitled `Changing me` and we looked at changes that we can control and changes that cannot be controlled like aging. We have talked about the differences between a baby, a toddler, a teenager, an adult, and an older adult. The children thought about the adults that are important in their lives and why they respect them.

Well done year 2 for your continued hard work.

#### Year 3

What another great week in year 3! In maths we have finished our unit on time with the children really grasping it! Make sure you ask them what time it is to help them really imbed all that new knowledge. In English we continued with our cowboy topic and planned our own adventure story. Next week we will be writing our last big write of the year, the time has gone so quick! Next week is also our end of term spelling test from all of the words we have learned since half term. Of the 30 words I will pick 10 at random so make sure you're practising.

## Year4

Year 4 have had an amazing week! In English, we have been writing our own cowboy adventure stories! We wrote the first paragraph together as a class, then continued independently. After finishing, we shared our stories with one another; we ain't gonna pass up the opportunity for reading! Yee haw!)

In maths, we have been studying line graphs and looking at the differences between these and bar charts. Towards the end of the week, we solved word problems using the graphs.

Our week finished with a visitor from the National Marine Aquarium! The lady spoke about her ReMEDIES project which involves engineering safer boating equipment for our sea life and their habitats. After her talk, it was over to us! Using equipment, we planned then engineered our own habitat-friendly anchors.

## Year 5

In year 5, we have come to the end of our geometry unit in maths and are now starting to look at converting units. Baking cakes or cooking at home are all practical applications of this, so why not spend the weekend preparing a feast fit for a Tudor monarch? We have spent the week writing our Tudor diaries either as a spit boy or a child actor - possibly the worst jobs in history. We have researched plenty of historical details to add to our writing, as well as hot seating to help us imagine how we would have felt doing these jobs. The highlight of our week though has to be the disco which was great fun at the end of a busy year. Thank you to the parents for organising it!

#### Year 6

Year 6 had an amazing week. We spent the week focusing on Art and different genres of Art. We studied Street Art, Cartoon and Pop Art. Within this we practiced our sketching skills and developed our ideas and then created a final piece. The children had a phenomenal week and really enjoyed the week.

## What to do if your child develops symptoms of COVID 19

# **Symptoms of COVID 19**

The most common symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are a recent onset of:

- New continuous cough/and/or
- High temperature and/or
- A loss of, or change in, normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)

# For most people, coronavirus (COVID-19) will be a mild illness.

## How to stop COVID-19 spreading

There are things you can do to help reduce the risk of you and anyone you live with getting ill with COVID-19. Do:

- wash your hands with soap and water often do this for at least 20 seconds
- use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available
- wash your hands as soon as you get home
- cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze put used tissues in the bin immediately and wash your hands afterwards
