Foundation

It's been a very busy week despite the bank holiday! We have been continuing with our theme of Jack and the Bean stalk writing the middle section of our story. We have also looked at the life cycle of a butterfly at how a caterpillar grows and changes over time.

Year 1

This week Year 1 have been continuing to extremely hard with their writing. We have continued to explore 'The Hungry Caterpillar' but this week we have chosen our own insect/animal and changed the story. The writing the children have produced on this has been amazing with all children developing very good ideas and including our writing features.

During maths we have started exploring 'doubling' and 'making equal groups'. This has been a real challenge for the children but they have shown fantastic effort and commitment to mastering these skills. Finally, in topic we have continued our work on insects and bugs by discussing the different body parts they may have and why they have them.

What to do if your child develops symptoms of COVID 19

If your child develops symptoms of COVID-19, **you should inform the school and organise for your child to be tested** via the <u>NHS online portal</u> or by calling 119. Your household should isolate until you receive the test results giving the all clear.

Symptoms of COVID 19

The most common symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) are a recent onset of:

- New continuous cough/and/or
- High temperature and/or
- A loss of, or change in, normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)

For most people, coronavirus (COVID-19) will be a mild illness.

How to stop COVID-19 spreading

There are things you can do to help reduce the risk of you and anyone you live with getting ill with COVID-19. Do:

- wash your hands with soap and water often do this for at least 20 seconds
- use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available
- wash your hands as soon as you get home
- cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze put used tissues in the bin immediately and wash your hands afterwards
